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Físh Tales

A Fish Story From the Journal of Henry David Thoreau Jan 4, 1856 Submitted by Frank Potter

A clear, cold day. To Walden to examine the ice.

Some fishermen had, apparently by accident, left two of their lines there, which were frozen in. They had apparently, taken no fish for, they had no well to put them in. I cut out the lines, the ice being about an inch thick around them, and pulled up a fine yellow pickerel which would weigh two pounds or more. At first I thought there was none for he was tired of struggling, but soon I felt him. The hook had caught the outside of the jaws, and the minnow hung entire by his side. It was very cold, and he struggled for a short time not being able to bend and quirk his tail; in a few minutes became quite stiff as he lay on the snowy ice. The water in his eyes was frozen, so that he looked like he had been dead a week.

About fifteen minutes after, thinking of what I heard about fishes coming to life again after being frozen, on being put in the water, I thought I would try it. This one was to appearance as he had been dead for a week. I stood him up on his tail without bending it. I put him into the water without removing the hook. The ice melted off, and its eyes looked bright again and after a minute or two I was surprised by a sudden convulsive quirk of the fish, and a minute or two later by another, and I saw that indeed it did revive, and drew it out again. Yet I do not believe that if it had been frozen solid through and through and thought it would be revived, but only when it is superficially frozen.

Nancy's Waders By Larry Niday

Nancy sat on the tailgate and looked at her new neoprene chest waders. The trip across Nebraska had been long and monotonous and gave me time to convince her that she needed to try wade fishing, something she really had no interest in. She loved fishing but wanted to do it from the top of the water, not in it. That was for the fish, not her. Her plans for the trip had been for two back-to-back days floating down the North Platte in a drift boat, possibly the most relaxing and carefree way to fish for trout in any environment, not hiking through sagebrush and splashing through the water. After convincing promises of fishing at an altitude above the snake line, or so I had been told, she reluctantly agreed to the waders and we had stopped at Cabela's in Kearney Nebraska to fit her with the gear she needed for this new adventure.

The entrance to the stream was easy to miss, I passed by it the first time even though I knew it was there. It was just an opening in the two-strand barbed wire fence nearly obscured by the tall wheatgrass. The parted weeds gave the only indication of traces of vehicle tracks passing through the gate. I pulled in and backed the truck onto a bare pea graveled spot along the inside of the fence. We crawled out of the truck and looked around the area. A sagebrush covered hill rose immediately on the east side of the parking area. To the south, a wide flat valley stretched to the base of the rocky bluffs in the distance. The only evidence of anyone having been there in the past was a narrow gray dirt path curving around the base of the hill, bordered by tufts of buffalo grass scattered among the knee-high sagebrush. She pulled on the waders and the boots, slid off the tailgate and stared at the path with a look of doubt on her face. I started out first just in case I needed to steer her away from any potential encounter. She followed closely behind, trying not to look down. In that manner, we circumvented the hill, until we were overlooking a riffled stream meandering through the sagebrush covered valley.

This was the lower section of a creek that flowed out of the Sierra Madres. It cut across the flat valley bottoms and under the highway to tumble its way through a canyon before it joined with the North Platte River. We had fished earlier that day in a shallow, wide, briskly moving part of the upper section. The fishing had been slow, but we were completely immersed in the kind of valley reminiscent of the dreams our fore-fathers brought to our shores. We were wading in ankle deep gin-clear water, carpeted with sand sculpted in waves by the moving water, but what kept our eyes glued to the bottom and forgetting the purpose that brought us there, was the gold flecks of mica that sparkled brilliantly under our feet. The mountains just west of us contained a large deposit of the mineral that washed down the slopes into the waterways. The morning sun, shining through the moving water created a glistening golden carpet that rolled out ahead of us as we walked through the water.

Occasionally, we woke from our reverie and cast at likely looking spots along the banks. On one of Nancy's errant casts, her fly caught in a tangle of willows. Being the consummate gentleman, I stepped forward to untangle it, when I saw a small snake swimming under the branches. I remembered what I had been told about the "snake line". Just a little bit miffed about the misinformation, I had to think quickly before she spotted it. I stepped between it and her and took my time working the fly loose, giving the little guy time to swim away into the weeds along the bank. I was congratulating myself on my quick thinking when she suggested that we move a few miles downstream where we would find deeper, more productive water.

We drove the rough, pocketed, two-track lane over a ridge about three miles to the paved road that led us to this downstream section of the stream. We eventually found ourselves standing in the cold water reaching to our calves. Following my usual habit of being dissatisfied with my first choice of fly, I stopped to change fly's, hoping to find something the fish would like. Looking down at the fly in my hand, I was startled by a water snake between my feet looking up at me. It was hiding under a patch of moss on the gavel bottom with just its head reaching out of the water. It seemed to be engrossed in watching me while I fumbled with these strange feathers in my hand. My heart jumped at the sound of Nancy's voice and looked up to see her splashing through the water towards me. I had kept her away from one earlier and couldn't risk her seeing this one either. So quickly, hoping to send her off in a different direction, I pointed at a pool of slow water to her right and said, "That looks like a good spot". She looked around and immediately turned and walked in that direction. But this was not good either, now she was in the lead and I wasn't able to walk point. I forgot about the fly and hurried to catch up with her. Then, my worst fears came true, she stopped, suddenly, frozen in place. I knew the signs. She could not scream. She could not talk. She could not move. All she could do was hoarsely whisper "Larry!".

I worked my way up to her and just asked "Where was it?". She regained her composure enough to point her rod to the right and whispered, "It swam in front of my knees and went over to that bank". Then she found her voice and turned around to face me. With the indignation of someone that had been talked into something she did not want to do in the first place, she snarled "These waders are for sale!"

I knew our fishing was done for the day and we needed to find the fastest way back to the truck. I looked at the hill and the path around its base. The path would be farther than she wanted to walk and hiking over the top meant pushing through heavy sagebrush. In her state of mind, neither was a good option. Giving her the choice, I asked, "How do you want to get back?" She turned to look at the hill and didn't look back as she answered, "Piggyback comes to mind".

We sold the waders.
