Looking Ahead:

Exciting things are ahead for 2026 and early 2027! The board has also established a tentative meeting schedule for the year. As we move forward, we will continue seeking partnerships that support conservation and fishing access, while looking for opportunities to provide more value for the Iowa fly fishing community through outreach and engagement.

Google Calendar, Plan A, Plan B, and getting more casts

Personally, I use this time of year to plan fly fishing trips and reflect on any issues from the previous year. Life got busy the last

few years and didn't get out as much as I wanted with some missed opportunities from lack of planning on my part. Some examples of lost time on the water are cancelled trips from rain blowouts and other weather events, getting to the water and realizing missing key gear, and missed opportunities from seasonal runs and other specific times of year opportunities.

This year I'm focused on maximizing time on the water - and always having a "Plan B". I've refreshed my "Plan B tote" with a few extra essentials - small items that are easy to overlook, but can truly make or break a day if they're missing. My plan is to keep the tote mostly in my truck, because it was sitting in my garage last year when I needed some extra nippers. In the past, I've canceled trips because of weather events like spring blowouts when I might still have been able to salvage the day. A better approach is to have a backup plan—such as knowing a few headwater stream sections that clear more quickly, or when traveling out of

state, identifying a nearby tail water or lake in case freestone rivers are blown out. The reverse can happen as well: when heavy generation makes tail waters unfishable, having an alternate option ready can still save the day on the water. I have started creating notes on my phone for backup options when conditions force a change.

To help avoid missing fishing opportunities, I created a specific Google Calendar for my favorite addiction. Google Calendar allows you to create separate calendars and color-code them. Below are a few examples of reminders and days I've blocked off on my fishing calendar. I've found that these reminders help motivate me to get out on the water, help with administrative tasks, and make the most of available opportunities.

- Calendar reminder about specific trout streams in the driftless that maybe fish better at certain times of the year.
- Late March entry about a specific pond loaded with carp in Des Moines that needs to be fished in early spring before moss coats the fly.
- Weeks blocked off during peak Mulberry season (carp)
- Weeks are highlighted during periods of historic white bass and wiper runs below central Iowa spillway's and lakes
- Reminder in January to print off and save the PDF for my fishing license to my phone after the auto renew happens.

Whatever ways you use to maximize your time on the water, I hope you have a great spring fishing.

HFFA Business Report

Hawkeye Fly Fishing Association Annual Meeting Minutes (2/28/26)

Location: Hilton Garden Inn Cedar Rapids, IA

Call to Order and Welcome:

The meeting was called to order at 11:38am by President Kirk Rosenow. Board members present included Kirk Rosenow, Ron Stahlberg, Dale Tayloe, Ronda Long-Craig, Pat Burns, Marty McVey, & Rob Kundert. Also present were Don Otto, Ryan Maas and about 50 HFFA members.

Kirk welcomed everyone to the 2026 HFFA Annual Show and Meeting. He thanked everyone on the show committee for organizing and executing a great show: Mike Jacobs, Doug Edel, Doug Nauman, Henry Moeller, Jacob Heit, Jeff Moore, John Gillenwater, Joseph Wolf, Lance Zook, Nick Hayes, Ray Thys, and Ronda Long-Craig.

Kirk gave a brief history of HFFA marking our 50th Anniversary noting how far trout fishing had come for Iowa in 50 years in terms of the number of 1)streams with some level of naturally reproducing trout and 2)streams open to public fishing, starting with 5 in 1976 to over 100 in 2025. Also, projects completed in the last year were discussed including 1)the Bear Creek Project with HFFA making a considerable contribution for the acquisition of 21 acres of land in Allamakee County and .35 miles of Bear Creek and 2)a stream improvement project near the Manchester Fish Hatchery on Spring Branch involving building and rebuilding of boulder clusters, J-Hooks, deflectors, and weirs.

Kirk announced the date and venue for the 2027 Annual Show and Meeting. The 2027 HFFA Annual Show will be Friday and Saturday, February 5-6, 2027, at the Courtyard Marriot in Ankeny, IA.

New Business:

Motion to nominate and approve Ron Dunek as Director from Central Iowa by Don Otto. Second by Mike Schrader. Motion approved.

Motion to nominate and approve Lisa Davis as Director from Quad Cities by Don Otto. Second by Dave Jones. Motion approved.

Treasurers Report: Ronda gave a Treasurer's report. Motion by Dale Tayloe to accept the treasurer's report as read. Second by Dave Jones. Motion approved.

General Discussion:

Kirk opened the floor for discussion. Various topics were brought forth by the membership for discussion including HFFA libraries, membership demographics, possible projects for 2026, and show rotation.

Adjournment:

Motion to adjourn by Ron Stahlberg at approximately 12:15pm. Second by Mike Schrader. Motion approved.

2026 Iowa State Fair Fly Tying Competition

The Iowa State Fair will be held August 13 through August 23, 2026. We will be holding the Fly-Tying competition once again this year. I am sure everyone has practiced tying their favorite flies and are willing to enter them in the state contest.

The Hawkeye Fly Fishing Association will again be sponsoring the Fly-Tying competition at this year's Iowa State Fair. The competition is supported by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources and the Iowa State Fair. The goal is to provide an opportunity for the public to view the art of fly tying and to promote fly fishing in Iowa.

The fly-tying display will be in the DNR Building on the Fairgrounds during the fair. The judging is tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, August 12th at 1:00 p.m. in the DNR Building.

Fly entries need to be received at the Fair Administration post office box by July 31, 2026.

There are three divisions

- Adult division is for anyone **17 years of age and older.**
- Junior division is for anyone **16 years and younger.**
- Expert division for tiers who have **sold flies.**

There are four categories for each division. The categories are the following:

- Dry Fly
- Wet Fly / Soft Hackle / Nymph
- Streamers
- Open Class

You may enter in each of the categories, but only **one fly for each category.** **No flies smaller than size #18. No flies larger than size #2.** **To enter, please provide the fly tier's name, the division to be entered, the category to be entered and the name of the fly.**

You must be an Iowa resident to enter or a member of the Hawkeye Fly Fishing Association. If you have **ever tied flies commercially or sold the flies that you have tied, you must enter the Expert Division.** If you won a blue ribbon for one of the categories last year, you are not permitted to enter the same category this year.

The Hawkeye Fly Fishing Association will provide judges for the competition. Ribbons will be given for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners. Each fly will be judged in its category. In our contest, a panel of judges will choose the places in each category and division. The visitors to the state fair will see the flies displayed in the DNR Building

Flies must be sent to the Iowa State Fair Administration Office, P.O. Box 57130, Des Moines, IA 50317 and received by **July 31, 2026.** Each fly entered must have the **fly tier's name, address, telephone number, name of the fly, division to be entered and the category.** **Junior division entries must state the age of the fly tier.**

Roasting McCaughey and the Chartreuse Chicken

Last year I attended Mike Jacobs’s fly-tying classes. The first night I went, I sat down by a man, whom I would soon come to know as, Gary McCaughey. I was expecting to learn how to tie those little trout flies. Mike said we were going to tie an Adams first since this was one of the most common flies you would use. Everyone got out a size 16 hook and proceeded to put it into their vise except Gary he had this very large hook that he was using. As Mike proceeded to explain how to tie this pattern, I keep watching Gary out of the corner of my eye. While everyone else was tying on very small tips of feathers, Gary had this bead chain out that he was tying on his hook.

Then everyone started to dub on this gray fur, but Gary had this awful green looking feather he was tying on. This continued on for weeks, as we all tied those little trout flies, Gary tied these big chartreuse colored flies, that he called four eyed puss bugs.

Now I was getting a little intimidated by Gary. I had read that trout only eat very small bugs, so why was he tying these green things in such a large size? Well come to find out Gary does very little trout fishing, he mostly fishes for bass and pan fish.

As time went on Mike explained about all the materials used in fly tying and where they come from. One night I asked Mike, where they get chartreuse feathers from. He said they came from some special chicken that was raised out west.

Well we were going out west this summer, so I decided to find one of those chartreuse chickens. As we traveled through the country side on our vacation I drove all the back roads through the farm communities looking for the chartreuse chicken. When I was just about to give up on finding one of them, we drove by a little farm and out in the barn lot low and behold was a chartreuse chicken. I slammed on the brakes and pulled into the farmer’s lot. I told the farmer I had been looking all over for this chicken and was very happy to find one. Well with a very sad face the farmer started telling me the story about how he had raised these chickens just for fly tiers and had worked many years to get just the right color and now it was coming to an end.

He said this was the very last chartreuse chicken all of the other ones have died from the dreaded spotted foot disease, and he was getting too old to start all over again. Well I was devastated, I had driven all these back roads trying to find this chicken and now it was the last one. I asked the farmer if I could use his phone and I called Denny Redmond and Mike Jacobs and told them of the dilemma. We decided to pull our money together and make an offer on the chicken. After an hour of bickering and horse trading, I walked away with the very last chartreuse chicken.

We still had two weeks of vacation left so we decided to put the chicken in the trunk. It was very hot that day so I put a pan of water and some food in the trunk with the chicken and we stopped every few miles to let the chicken out for air and to do its thing.

We got to Cody, Wyoming and decided to go to the Buffalo Bill Museum. It was very hot so we decided to cool the chicken off as best we could before going in and then we would come back soon so as not to keep the chicken locked up too long. It took forever to get through the museum with all the people and long lines and when we finally did get out it had really gotten hot.

I ran to the car and opened the trunk, but it was too late the chicken was dead. What have I done? I thought, I have just killed the last chartreuse chicken. I called Denny and Mike and told them what I had done and asked them what they thought I should do. We decided to find a taxidermist and have the chicken stuffed.

We continued with our vacation and a few weeks after we arrived home this box came and in it was the mounted chartreuse chicken. I decided since I had killed the chicken I had no right to keep the chicken. I called Denny and asked him if he wanted it. His wife said that chartreuse did not match the décor of their house. I called Mike and his wife said “you are not going to keep that chicken in our house”. So Gary, since you are what we call “The King of Chartreuse” we feel it only right for you to have this, the last Chartreuse Chicken. We hope you will display it proudly.

“The Fly”

First Place Essay at the 2026 HFJA Annual Meeting & Show

Several years ago, dad asked me to restore his bamboo fly rod. It was the only fly rod he ever had. I told him I would be glad to but there was something I wanted in return. “What would that be?” he asked. I told him I wanted the fly he tied when he was a teenager. He said, “I think we can make that happen. It’s a deal.” I have the first fly I tied. I thought it would be pretty cool if the two flies were displayed together in a frame on a shelf or on the wall.

I had never actually seen his fly, but I had heard about it for as long as I remember. It was sort of legendary. There was a story often told about this fly, the only one I knew of that dad tied.

Dad grew up on a farm several miles outside of town. He spent a lot of time while growing up down at the creek. If his chores were done and if he was not at school chances are he’d be at the creek wandering, hunting squirrels or raccoons, skipping stones across the water, building dams or water wheels, looking for gold, or fishing. When he was about 14, he repeatedly saw a bass in the clear water from the bank above the creek. If he was careful not to scare the fish, he would see it often in the large pool. Soon the idea occurred to him that he could catch this fish. He tried worms, minnows, plugs, spinners, and spoons over the course of several days. The fish never took the bait. He would look at it but it never took the bait. Dad thought what he needed was a fly. But where to get one? Trips to town were rare except for school and shopping at stores having flies was even more rare. Mail ordering might work but that too would cost money which he didn’t have and would take too much time. Come a good rain, the creek could rise and the bass could move. He decided he would tie a fly using materials found at home. He found a hook in his dad’s tackle and his mom gave him some thread. He used some hair from the tail of a fox squirrel and tractor magneto shellac as head cement and tied his fly.

The next day, after school and after completing chores, off he went to the creek with a rod and the fly. He approached the creek and pool very cautiously to not spook the fish. He cast the fly out a few feet in front of the fish. Wham! The fish attacked it! And it was hooked! The bass fought a good fight but Dad landed it! It all happened so fast! Grandpa, grandma, dad and dad’s 4 siblings had fish that night with supper. The fly worked!

Dad was happy that I wanted the old fly. He would have gladly given it to me. There was just one problem; the fly was nowhere to be found. It wasn’t in the bottom of the green metal tackle box where it was supposed to be and where it apparently had resided for years. The search continued for months. No stone was left unturned so to speak. Dad thought the fly might have been included in a bunch of fishing tackle he had given my brother. Nope. It wasn’t there. Finally, one day as dad was preparing to have an auction, the fly was found in one of about 6 coffee cups boxed up and ready to be placed on the auction table. The fly was saved!

Dad handed me the fly. After all that and the near loss of the legendary family heirloom, I didn’t have the heart to take it from him. I gave it back in a display box I made complete with a light at the top so 94 year-old eyes could more easily see what had been created nearly eight decades earlier. This year I finished restoring the old bamboo rod keeping my end of the bargain. Someday I might own both the rod and the fly, and for sure, sooner than I would like.
